5. **Join the Safe Computing Email list** (full details on our website)



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


Safe Computing with your Computers


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Be Safe When Computing

When your computer is attached to the Internet, it is always to some extent 'visible'. When you receive an email or look at website, your computer is exposed to the risk of picking up a computer virus or an attempt to compromise it. Contrary to popular belief, you don't have to open an email or activate an attached file to trigger an "infection". A brand-new and unprotected PC can be fatally compromised in as little as 20 minutes after connecting to Broadband.

Protect yourself: The good news is that you can protect yourself effectively, but it needs proactive work to make sure that your system is secure and unaffected.



As you will have read in the press, there are malign people in the computing world who are continually trying to compromise and vandalise personal computers. SPAM is a £100 million business. When Spammers and 'Crackers' succeed, the result is a computer that doesn't work. Is a danger to the Internet Community and which needs reinstalling from scratch. You may well lose all your work - which will seriously affect your ability to study or teach. It might also adversely affect your business if you use your computer to help you run it.
